The story itself is the modern version of a Greek tragedy by Sophocles adapted by Jean Anouilh. A "generation gap" is present when the king orders the body of Antigone's brother to rot after his death in a civil war. Antigone secretly buries her brother against the king's orders, but the king is willing to forget the offense, if she will marry his son.

"Antigone" will be played by Tina Mangert with Mike Panther as Creon, Pat Foley as the Nurse, Tim Sullivan as Haemon, Cathy Buescher as Ismene, Ruth Leahy as Eurydice, Don Cota as the messenger, and Steve Hage as the Page.

Guards will be played by Tom Tolle, Bernie Daly, and Steve Bick. Laslo Nemeth is leading a chorus of several other seniors who will provide additional background.


Another mistake made by this electronic device was that Lori Cota '72, Marian Story '72, and Mary Hagerly '72, were all matched with Betsy Butts '69.

teacher really didn't care about him and he
disliked him. Freddie's friend was Charley
Carter. Charley helped Freddie because he
was interested in him, and because he wanted
Freddie to learn and better himself. Charley
proved that the best way of dealing with
people is to be yourself. Phonies are quickly

ing was shown at the end when Billy and

tarded do not have any knowledge about
them. I know what it is like; my sister is re-
tarded.

The performance of Billy Schulman, a re-
tarded boy chosen for the role, was outstand-
ing. Even a "normal" person has to be a
strong individual to undergo the strain of
acting. This drama proved the capabilities of
the retarded.

In this every day world where conflicts, de-
cisions and frustrations are numerous, there is


L-O-V-E

who is also hungry.


And then think of what

This was the nucleus of the team that last year compiled a 9-6-1 record while they played against some mighty tough competition. Others who are shaping up for the new season are Don Cota '69, and sophomores Steve Lischwe and Mike Grady. Several interested freshmen remain to be tested for the future of Costa's golf.

All in all, it looks like a very respectable spring campaign for the Friars, but, as we all know, anything can happen.


The number one ranked team in practically every poll has been the Maywood Proviso East Pirates. This could be the year for the Hayes, former All-American at Houston.

I don't believe any junior has the right to expect or take senior privileges. These privileges were granted to the seniors. They make senior year even more special and more worth waiting for.




